MINISTER'S MESSAGE

My faith family, the Advent Season is filled with traditions which take us back to the people who created them. Perhaps you have a tradition of marching out into woods and cutting down your own Christmas tree or maybe your tradition is baking tin upon tin of cookies to share with your community and family. One of my traditions, at the start of Advent, is picking up the book "A Christmas Carol" by Charles Dickens. In stave three is one of my favorite scenes as the Cratchits all sit down for Christmas dinner. We all know, of course, the meal was a modest one to say the least and yet here is the response:

"Bob said he didn't believe there ever was such a goose cooked. Its tenderness and flavour, size and cheapness, were the themes of universal admiration. Eked out by apple-sauce and mashed potatoes, it was a sufficient dinner for the whole family; indeed, as Mrs. Cratchit said with great delight (surveying one small atom of a bone upon the dish), they hadn't ate it all at last! Yet everyone had had enough, and the youngest Cratchits in particular, were steeped in sage and onion to the eyebrows!"

It was a simple meal that many would overlook, but to the Cratchits, who knew the difficulty of poverty all too well, it was a feast unlike any they had had before.

Throughout the Advent Season, it is easy to become distracted by the festive lights, the decorations, and the shopping, but at its heart, the first Nativity is a story born out of poverty. An unwed couple without the means to secure shelter for the evening, giving birth in a barn surrounded by animals, witnessed by the least and the lowest that society has to offer. The great miracle is that this profound scarcity is turned into abundance by a God who will stop at nothing to be with us! Our God chooses to be born into abject poverty and yet has all He needs surrounded by loving parents and the warmth of that simple stable.

As a faith community, we have traveled through scarcity throughout COVID only to find great abundance. We have reached out online, connecting with members who would have otherwise been unable to worship. The dedicated volunteers of this community have not only continued allowing us to function as a Untied Church but have also met the needs of our members on a variety of levels and dared to dream and vision for the future. The rummage sale was an overwhelming success and most recently we had more volunteers show for the pancake breakfast than we had jobs to give them. We are an engaged and engaging community of faith who have an abundance of gifts, talents and skills that have enabled fellowship and the continued work of Jesus in this world.

On this journey into the season of Advent, as we all once again edge our way to the manger, hoping to catch a glimpse of the Christ child, it is my prayer we do so knowing the abundance of God's love for us, and the abundance of our love for one another in this wonderful community of faith. In this season of waiting, Jesus will stop at nothing to be with us. May we stop at nothing to meet Him at that simple manger that has been filled with the abundance of God.
